Notes From Fr. Joji: On Friday, August 15th, we will celebrate the Solemnity of the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary. It is a Holy Day of Obligation, meaning that Mass attendance is obligatory. As Catholics, we believe that at the end of her earthly life, the Blessed Virgin Mary was taken up, body and soul, into Heaven. This act of divine favor is known as the Assumption of the Blessed Virgin Mary, and it allowed Mary to participate in her Son's Resurrection. In her glory, she gives us cause to hope that we, too, can one day share in Christ's Resurrection. The beloved disciple, often identified as St. John, later took Mary to his home in Ephesus. From extra biblical sources, Mary lived there for many years before she died and was buried in a tomb. But it didn't just end there. These extra biblical sources also related that one of the Apostles, St. Thomas, was absent when Mary died and was buried because he was in India doing his ministry. When he came to Ephesus and wanted to pay his respect, he asked to see her body. But upon opening the tomb, Mary's body was not there. Instead, there were sweet smelling flowers growing where her body lay. The rest of the Apostles attested that the tomb was not opened ever since Mary's body was laid in it, and hence they concluded that God must have assumed her body into heaven along with her soul.

And since they had witnessed the Ascension of Jesus into heaven, they concluded that the same thing happened to Mary. And since Mary was conceived without sin, sin had not touched or defiled her soul, then God would not allow her body to turn to dust but rather assumed her body to heaven to share in the glory of the Risen Christ. From then till now, it was the common belief in the Church that Mary's body was assumed into heaven. But it was only in 1950, 15th August, that Pope Pius XII officially declared Mary's Assumption as an article of faith. In other words, the Church has boldly declared that Mary is in heaven, body and soul, a declaration that is definite and irreversible. It was a declaration not just on the authority of the Church but also under the authority of the Holy Spirit. Let us be especially mindful of Mary's desire, that we might one day come to share in eternal life in Heaven with her and all the Angels and Saints. Let us strive to follow her example and love God with our whole being, serving Him by pouring ourselves out in humble love and service to others. Let us also seek to grow in our devotion to our Blessed Mother, for her prayers help us to live more fully and faithfully as disciples of her Son, and her example of heroic virtue is an inspiration to us all.

Introduction to the Roman Missal – PART IVA

The Liturgy of the Eucharist: Understanding the Ritual and Meaning

Last week, we concluded our discussion at the Universal Prayer (Prayer of the Faithful). This week, we turn our attention to the Liturgy of the Eucharist. According to the General Instruction of the Roman Missal (GIRM), once the Universal Prayer is completed, all are seated, and the Offertory chant begins. This marks a pivotal moment in the liturgy, emphasizing the participation of the faithful. During the Offertory, certain members of the congregation bring forward the bread and wine, signifying the active participation of the faithful. There are prayers of blessing, acknowledging God's providence in providing these gifts. These prayers may be spoken silently or aloud, and when spoken aloud, the congregation responds, "Blessed be God forever." Unfortunately, many view the Offertory as a mere pause in the Mass—a time to sit and wait while preparations take place at the altar. However, the significance is much deeper.

The Offertory is not only about preparing the gifts of bread and wine; it is also about preparing ourselves. Each one of us is called to offer our hearts and lives on the spiritual altar, joining our prayers, joys, and sorrows to Christ's sacrifice. This is a moment to consciously unite ourselves with what is about to unfold on the altar. A meaningful personal practice is to ask the Holy Spirit to place our needs and intentions upon the paten, and those of our loved ones, living and deceased, into the chalice, uniting them to Christ's sacrifice.
