Today we celebrate the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph. We are also reminded today of the importance of the fact that through the Incarnation. Jesus Christ was born into a human family, and that offers us hope for making Christ the center of our own families. God could have chosen any number of ways to enter into human history, and the way he chose was to have Jesus be incarnate of a woman – the Blessed Virgin Mary – and be raised by her and Joseph in a household common to that time. In other words, God did not just take on human form in the person of Jesus, but entered into every aspect of human life, engaging with the authentic human experience of family life. Family life is sanctifying and as Jesus sanctified his own human family, he will also sanctify ours when we welcome him in.

One's family should be the best place to learn and practice the virtues that Paul outlines in his letter to the Colossians – mercy, kindness, bearing with one another, patience and forgiveness. It is in our families that we can experience joy, celebration, and love. The family is the basic unit of our parish, and each one is important to the whole. We need each other. As Catholics, we can look to the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph as a model for our families to emulate.

Whatever our age, whatever our role in the family, the Holy Family speaks to all of us of unity, loyalty, and humility before God. Joseph, Mary, and Jesus cared for each other and trusted completely in God. They were open to his grace at work in their lives and supported one another in times of trial and suffering. In our world today, as the family is under attack from many sides, this is just the example that can keep us focused on the ultimate goal for our families. That goal is to help each other grow in holiness and grace before our Almighty Father.

January 1: Solemnity of Holy Mary Mother of God: What is the most beautiful name of Mary? It is the name that God, through the Archangel Gabriel, used in the Annunciation: "Kecharitoméne" -"full of grace". This indicates "that she has always been and will always be the beloved, the elect, the one chosen to welcome the most precious gift, Jesus: 'the Incarnate love of God'" (Pope Benedict XVI, Angelus, December 8, 2006). God made her so full of grace in view of the infinitely great and sublime role she was called to fulfill in the economy of salvation – to be the Mother of the Son of God. Hence, among the many revered titles attributed to her, the oldest title is "Mother of God." Many people may still be uncomfortable with this title, but the simple explanation is this: Mary bore in her womb and gave birth to Jesus Christ. This is a historical fact. So, definitely, she is the Mother of Jesus Christ. And who is Jesus Christ? He is the Son of God, the Second Person of the Most Holy Trinity; He is True God. Mary is the Mother of the Son who is God. From the very beginning of Christianity, there has been no doubt or question about this title. The early Christians have ever since called her "Theotokos", the Greek word for "God-bearer", for indeed, she bore in her womb the God -made-Man. She is the Mother of God. The Eternal Word took His human body from Mary, so that this body of true human nature will be offered in sacrifice for our sake (cf. St. Athanasius)

We begin the New Year as the World Day of Prayer for Peace. Yes, peace has to be prayed for. We have to ask God in humble supplication to grant us the peace that the world cannot give. It is the peace that is the fruit of complete obedience to God's will. In this, we need not only pray. We are called to action - to proclaim and obey the Prince of Peace, Jesus Christ. He was born in Bethlehem, but he must also be continually born in our hearts as we welcome Him in every Eucharistic Communion. And then, like Mary, we must also share Him with others. As everybody embraces and follows Him, then and only then can there be true and lasting peace in the world. May you all have a peaceful and blessed New Year!
