Please call the rectory or the priest when someone is ill and unable to come to church. **February 1 Gospel Reflection:** Today, we celebrate the Feast of the Presentation of the Lord, a moment filled with profound significance. In the Gospel, Mary and Joseph, united as loving parents, journey to Jerusalem to present Jesus in the Temple as required by the Law of Moses. This act is a model of faith and devotion, showing the importance of parents working together to raise their children in faith. The law required every firstborn of Israel to be offered to God as a memorial of their deliverance from slavery in Egypt.

For the first time, Jesus enters His Temple, and His presence transforms those around Him, especially Simeon and Anna. Simeon, having long awaited the Messiah, proclaims that he is now ready to die, not because of old age but because his encounter with Jesus fulfills his deepest longings. This reminds us that only Jesus can truly satisfy the human heart. We also reflect on the Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Although free from sin, Mary humbly fulfills the law, showing her deep obedience and devotion to God. Her humility teaches us the path to lasting peace and intimacy with God.

Additionally, we celebrate Candelaria, the blessing of candles, which symbolizes Christ as the Light of the World. Simeon's joyful proclamation, "a light for revelation to the Gentiles", reminds us that Jesus is the light who dispels the darkness of sin and brings salvation to all. The candles we bless today—used at Mass, baptisms, and other sacred moments—represent to warmth and love of Christ, calling us to be His light in the world. As we celebrate these Three events—the Presentation of the Lord, the Purification of Mary, and Candelaria—let us strive to imitate Simeon's joy, Anna's Faith, and Mary's humility. May we become candles of Christ, spreading His light, love, and hope to those around us.

It is an opportunity to reflect on our relationship with God, see forgiveness for our sins, and deepen our commitment to living a truly Christian life.

The Jubilee Year is also a time of gaining indulgences aimed at remitting temporal punishment for sins, Providing a chance for spiritual purification and holistic growth. The various ways to obtain indulgences during this year have been outlined in the official Church guidelines.

The Jubilee Year of 2025 became the second under the pontificate of Pope Francis. The extraordinary Jubilee, the Year of Mercy, was celebrated in 2016. This time, Pope Frances invited the faithful to live the holy year as "Pilgrims in Hope"—the motto of the jubilee of 2025. Thejubilee logo designed by Italian artist Giacomo Travisani, showed four stylized figures representing all of humanity comin from the four corners of the earth. They embraced each other to indicate the solidarity and fraternity which should unite all peoples. The rough waves under the figures symbolized the fact that life's pilgrimage did not always go smoothly in calm waters. The anchor became a symbol of hope. The dynamic cross of Christ bent down towards humanity, not leaving them alone, but stretching out to offer the certainty of His presence and the security of hope.
