My dear brothers and sisters in Christ,

Today's Gospel (Luke 15:1-3, 11-32) contains the parable of the prodigal son, and it highlights the essential elements of what true forgiveness and reconciliation is all about. In the parable, a man has two sons. One decides to ask for his inheritance, leave home, and have a great time. When all has been spent and he has nothing left, he decides to go back home and beg for forgiveness. The twist in the story is that his father welcomes him back instantly, not caring about what or how he lost everything. In fact, he does not even wait for the son to get back into the house; he goes out to him, welcomes him back, and celebrates his return. The same can be true for us in our relationship with God.

Real reconciliation is about forgiveness and forgetting. God's unconditional love for us involves his forgiveness and forgetting the sins that we have committed when we express our true sorrow. We are asked to do the same with those who have hurt us and seek our forgiveness as well. As members of the Body of Christ – the Church – reconciliation is an important part of our lives. Lents affords us the opportunity to be reconciled to God and to one another through forgiveness and forgetting. In doing so, we realize more fully the love of God in our lives.

The Gospel parable of the merciful father reveals to us, once again, God's unconditional love for us. It is a lesson that perhaps needs more attention as we deal with hurts and disappointments, and the sins and wrongdoings of our lives. In the end, our call is to realize that true reconciliation is not only about forgiving, it is also about forgetting once the forgiveness has taken place, that we might not harbor ill will. Otherwise, have we truly forgiven?

As brothers and sisters of Christ and members of his Church, we are called to follow him to the Father. We are also to be ambassadors for Christ, helping others to reconcile with the Father. We are called not to be the resentful older brother of the parable, but to be a brother or a sister who with the Son goes out looking for the Father's lost children and helping them come home.

"What is "Laetare Sunday," *Laetare*—meaning "rejoice" in Latin—serves as an apt reminder of the joy that awaits us after the upcoming darkness of the Passion. The mysteries we prepare to celebrate take root in God's promise to love. Today is a day overflowing with grace. Turn to the Lord and affirm your faith for the joy of Easter is right around the corner! Today, the liturgy offers us an early scent of Easter joy. The celebrant's vestments are rose-colored. It is "Laetare Sunday," inviting us to a serene joy. "Rejoice with Jerusalem and be glad because of her, all you who love her...." sings the entrance antiphon. God wants us to be happy. The most basic psychology tells us that a person who does not live happily eventually becomes ill, both in body and spirit. However, our joy must be well-founded, it must be the expression of the serenity of living a life with full meaning. Otherwise, joy would degenerate into superficiality and folly. Saint Teresa of Ávila accurately distinguished between "holy joy" and "foolish joy." The latter is only external, short-lived, and leaves a bitter aftertaste. We live in challenging times for the life of faith. But they are also exciting times. Soon we will accompany this only Son on His path of death and resurrection. We will contemplate the love of the One who loves so much that He gave Himself for us, for you and for me. And we will be filled with love and look upon Him "whom they have pierced" (Jn 19:37), and a joy will grow in us that no one can take away. The true joy that lights up our life does not come from our effort. Saint Paul reminds us: it does not come from you, it is a gift from God, "for we are his handiwork" (Eph 2:10). Let us allow ourselves to be loved by God and to love Him, and our joy will be great this coming Easter and throughout our lives. And let's not forget to let ourselves be embraced and renewed by God by making a good confession during this season of Lent.
