The Feast of the Archangels is celebrated on September 29: This Monday we celebrate the Feast of the Archangels Michael, Gabriel, and Raphael, Jesus mentioned the presence of angels in His ministry. These pure spirits have the responsibility of representing God here on earth. The word "angel" means messenger. God wanted to make His presence felt and His will be known. These archangels are a divine gift meant to help us on our earthly journey. Angels provide that presence by guiding, protecting, informing and warn. These Archangels played very important roles in salvation history.

St. Michael Archangel is known as one "who is like God!" He led the angels against Lucifer and the evil spirits. St. Michael is revered as a powerful protector and warrior who leads the heavenly hosts in battle against the forces of evil. He is often depicted with a sword, fighting the devil, and is invoked as a defender of the Church and a protector of souls. St. Michael's role in the Bible is most notably described in the Book of Revelation, where he leads the heavenly armies in their battle against the dragon (Satan).

When Pope Leo XIII had a vision in 1899 that the Church will be attacked by evil in the 20th century, he asked for St. Michael's protection through a prayer. "Christian tradition recognizes four offices of Saint Michael: (i) to fight against Satan (ii) to rescue the souls of the faithful from the power of the enemy, especially at the hour of death. (iii) to be the champion of God's people, (iv) to call away from earth and bring men's souls to judgment."

St. Gabriel (God's strength) Archangel appeared before Mary and announced the birth of John the Baptist. It is believed that it was also Gabriel who appeared before Joseph and the shepherds. By virtue of its role and mission, Mary, Joseph, Zechariah and Elizabeth, the shepherds, and Jesus' agony in Gethsemane were provided the grace of the strength in accepting and believing the Good News of the coming of the Messiah.

Saint Raphael (God has healed) Archangel appeared in the Book of Tobit. Archangel Raphael healed the blind Tobias in the Book of Tobit; thus St. Raphael is invoked to ask for God's healing and mercy. The angel is also believed to be the angel in the fifth chapter of John who bestowed healing power on the pond so that the first to enter it when the water moved will be healed of whatever sickness.

God's protection, power, and healing come through these angels. It is interesting to note that their popularity rose after the exile. When the Israelites longing for God's presence was finally satisfied after being freed, they found God's manifestation of Himself in the angels. Which brings the question; Have we experienced God through His archangels? There is a story told about their encounter with St. Michael Archangel. One lady and her friend were walking in a dark and isolated alley. Suddenly, two men appeared behind them stalking them. She immediately asked the intercession of St. Michael by praying the prayer for protection given by Pope Leo XIII. Before they knew it, the two men stopped following them and disappeared. She believed St. Michael helped them.

PRAYER: Holy Archangels, St. Michael, St. Gabriel and St. Raphael, surround us with your protection and pray for our special needs as we journey towards the heavenly Kingdom which is filled with the voices of praise and worship of our Glorious God by the vast choirs of angels. Amen.

Notes From Fr. Joji: The month of October is recognized as a month of special devotion to the Blessed Virgin Mary, with particular emphasis on the praying of the Rosary. The Catholic Church looks upon the Blessed Virgin Mary as not only the Mother of God, but also as the Mother of the Church. She is a model of faith, a sign of hope, and holds a special place in the Communion of Saints. God honored Mary above all human persons by inviting her to be the mother of His Son. In honoring Mary, the Catholic Church is following the example of God Himself. We do not worship Mary as a goddess, but rather honor her for her privileged role in salvation history.

It was the Archangel Gabriel at the Annunciation who declared to Mary that she was "full of grace" (Luke 1:28) and that she had "found favor with God" (Luke 1:30). During the Visitation, Mary's kins woman Elizabeth, filled with the Holy Spirit, called her "blessed among women" (Luke 1:42); and Mary herself declared that "all generations shall call me blessed" (Luke 1:48). We honor Mary because Jesus honored her, and we are called to imitate Jesus. Catholics ask for Mary's intercession for the same reason that we ask for prayers from one another: "the fervent prayer of a righteous person is very powerful" (James 5:16). Because Jesus is the one mediator between God and human beings (2 Timothy 2:5), we intercede for one another as members of Christ's Body, the Church. And if we can ask the prayers of one another, surely we should not fail to ask the Blessed Virgin Mary and the saints to pray for us as well.

All true devotion to Mary is ultimately devotion to Jesus as she seeks to always bring us closer to her Son. As we meditate upon the mysteries of the Rosary, we reflect upon the life and ministry of Jesus. Mary invites us to follow the ways of her Son today, just as she once said to the waiters at the wedding feast at Cana: "Do whatever He tells you" (John 2:5).

FEAST OF THE HOLY GUARDIAN ANGELS

October 2nd is the Feast of the Holy Guardian Angels. Although Guardian Angels have been venerated since the early days of the Church, it wasn't until the 17th century that Pope Clement X extended their feast day to the Universal Church. Although not a dogmatic article of the faith, it is a firmly established Catholic belief that each individual human being has their own Guardian Angel assigned to them by God to watch over their soul, help them avoid sin and temptation, and lead them to heaven, taken in part from Jesus' words in the Gospel of Matthew: "See that you do not despise one of these little ones, for I say to you that their angels in heaven always look upon the face of my heavenly Father." The Church thanks God for our heavenly helpers, the Guardian Angels, who minister to us in our need and guide us on the path of salvation. The Guardian Angel prayer reads, "Angel of God, my guardian dear, to whom his love commits me here, ever this day be at my side, To light and guard, to rule and guide. Amen.
